


Missional Budget

Our annual budget is more than numbers on a page — it's a ministry plan. Every dollar given supports the work of *Living Generously*, *Loving Boldly* through six core areas of ministry:

- Worship & Hospitality (43% | \$613,667) Creating space where all are welcomed, inspired, and nourished through meaningful worship, music, and fellowship.
- Schools, Preschool & CDC (17% | \$246,205) Providing safe, caring, and faith-rooted learning environments where children thrive and families are supported.
- Discipleship & Faith Formation (17% | \$239,557) Nurturing faith at every stage of life through Bible study, confirmation, youth ministry, intergenerational learning, and spiritual growth opportunities.
- Service & Justice (13% | \$180,511) Acting for justice, compassion, and systemic change through ministries like Neighbors in Need, Living Water, Esperanza, quilt-making for Lutheran World Relief, and advocacy work.
- **Outreach & Community Engagement (5% | \$79,937)** Building partnerships, responding to community needs, and sharing God's love with neighbors near and far.
- **Care Ministry (5% | \$73,843)** Walking alongside members and friends through prayer, pastoral care, and tangible acts of support in times of need.

When we give generously, we are not just funding programs — we are investing in lives, relationships, and the ongoing story of God's love at work through Trinity.



Compassion Meeting Needs, Near and Far

"Clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, bumility, gentleness, and patience."

Compassion is love in action. At Trinity, compassion takes many forms: warm quilts stitched for Lutheran World Relief, hot breakfasts and essential supplies shared through our Neighbors in Need program, clean water brought to communities through Living Water, shelter for families built with Esperanza International, and deepening connections with Volunteers of America as we anticipate the opening of the Lynnwood Neighborhood Center. These ministries are tangible expressions of faith working through love — meeting needs, offering hope, and embodying God's care for the world.

One way we extend compassion beyond our walls is through Trinity's Mission Giving Fund, which designates 2% of our annual contribution income to support local ministry partners. In 2025, our congregation chose Cocoon House, providing shelter and support for youth experiencing homelessness, as the recipient of these gifts.

Mission Giving Fund Options

The Access Project is a collaborative movement empowering youth in South Snohomish County, especially Black, Indigenous, and People of Color and underserved young people. Through mentorship, mental health support, and community programs like peer mediation, art, sports, and leadership development, The Access Project helps youth feel valued, connected, and equipped to thrive. By investing in this work, we help create safe spaces where young people can grow with confidence and hope.

Businesses Ending Slavery & Trafficking (BEST) Alliance works to prevent human trafficking and support survivors by equipping employers with tools to create safer workplaces and meaningful job opportunities. Through awareness campaigns, employee trainings, and partnerships with businesses across the U.S. and beyond, BEST addresses the root causes of trafficking while opening doors for survivors to rebuild their lives. Supporting BEST extends Trinity's compassion to a global movement for freedom, dignity, and justice.

Lynnwood Neighborhood Center Service Providers. The Lynnwood Neighborhood Center, now nearing completion, will bring together trusted organizations to serve families and individuals in South Snohomish County. Partner agencies include the Boys & Girls Club, Medical Teams International, Cocoon House, ChildStrive, and many more. Choosing this option means our Mission Giving Fund will be distributed evenly among all service providers at the Center, multiplying the impact of our generosity across a broad spectrum of community needs — from childcare and health care to housing and education.

Creative Ways to Give

Generosity doesn't always begin and end with a check. Consider prayerfully how these options might help you step forward in faith:

- Redirect funds from completed commitments or expenses (e.g., a finished loan payment) to support TLCS ministry.
- Practice Priority Budgeting rearrange priorities to free resources for God's work.
- **♦ Share Increases in Income** dedicate a portion (or all) of a raise or bonus to ministry.
- **Give from Stored Assets** such as appreciated stock, real estate, or other investments.
- **Employer Matching Gifts** see if your workplace will match your charitable giving.
- Lifestyle Trade-offs skip a coffee, meal out, or subscription service and redirect those funds.

Stepping out in generosity requires courage, but God meets us there. As we commit what we can, in faith and love, we trust that God will use every gift to bless others and transform lives.

Hospitality

Making Space for All

"Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God."

ROMANS 15:7

Hospitality is one of the clearest ways faith becomes action. It's more than politeness or being friendly — it's an intentional welcome that reflects the heart of Christ. When we greet someone at the door, share a meal, remember a name, or make room for another's story, we are living out Paul's vision of faith that works through love. At Trinity, hospitality is part of our worship, our fellowship, and our daily life together — a way of saying with our words and actions, "You belong here."

Community is where our **faith is lived, tested, strengthened, and shared**. At Trinity, we are not just a collection of individuals — we are a body, **knit together by God's grace**, learning from one another, and supporting each other in our journeys of faith.

Living Generously, Loving Boldly invites us to nurture that shared life through reflection, prayer, and worship. As we listen for God's voice together, we also listen for how God may be calling us to live generously — with our time, care, resources, and presence — so that Christ's love continues to be shared in our neighborhood and in the world.

The devotional guide on the following pages is meant to be used in the days leading up to each Sunday in October. Each week offers scripture, music, poetry, prayers, and prompts to help you enter worship already prepared to hear God's word with open hands and open hearts. Set aside time during the week — on your own, with family, or with a small group — to pray, read, and reflect. Let these devotions shape how you come to worship ready to encounter God and to respond with generosity and bold love.

In this way, prayer becomes a wellspring for action, and devotion shapes our generosity.

Belief Is a Garden by Susan Noyes Anderson

Belief is a garden our hearts choose to grow.

Hope is the rich ground we need.
